


Tree Huggers show the love!



Others were surprised to learn about the variety and value of the remnant forest species growing there.

Andrew Lambkin commented, "It's heartbreaking that all the battles of the 80s to protect this significant bushland from the M5 East, followed by a decade of regenerative stewardship by volunteers, could come to nought because successive generations of RTA/RMS idiots have learned nothing from the 'capacity trap' of simply building more motorways. What would \$4.5 billion achieve if spent on public transport in and through the district instead?"

SALTMARSH RESTORATION DELAYED



Restoration work on the natural saltmarsh area below Jackson Place, Undercliffe is temporarily held up by extensive remedial works being carried out by Roads and Maritime Services to the former illegal tip site above the area (shown left).

Works are expected to begin at the end of the year on the unusually diverse saltmarsh – one that is rare in the Cooks River catchment and is an Endangered Ecological Community. It is threatened by surrounding weeds, but also by encroaching Mangroves and the grant supported works will address both of these issues. MOTORWAY MADNESS Peter Stevens' letter to the St George Leader, 6 August Reflections on M5 Congestion

Duplicating motorways is no solution to congestion, except in the short term. The M5E was close to capacity within two years. Los Angeles has 20-lane highways that are congested.


More road space attracts more cars until congestion frustration is reached again. It sucks passengers off public transport. Patronage on the East Hills line dropped when the M5E opened.

Motorways cost megabucks and suck limited infrastructure funds away from public transport projects. For our money we get a continuation of congested roads and inadequate public transport.


As with energy supply and air-conditioner use, capacity gets built to service the peaks and is often underused. Road peaks are largely due to solo drivers commuting. Draw more of them off the roads and existing capacity can cope.

Congestion is self-limiting, provided there are good public transport alternatives available. People reach their congestion frustration limit and switch. It's also more egalitarian, as wealthy people cannot buy priority use, unlike using road charges to reduce congestion.

Climate change and peak oil issues already make it foolish to build more fuel demand into our future planning.



In the Valley...



A young couple of the feathered kind have settled in Sydney's inner west with plans of starting a family to the delight of Sydney's bird watching community and the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS).

For the first time on record, the pair of Black-fronted Dotterels has set up home on a stony patch of ground at Wolli and NPWS Ranger, Paul Ibbetson, said parks staff were thrilled that the birds had chosen a site that was recently created for migratory birds and local species.

"This is an exciting event for Wolli because it's the first breeding attempt by Black-fronted Dotterels here that we know of ever, which makes all our efforts creating this new habitat worthwhile," Mr Ibbetson said.

"We've been seeing these birds regularly at a salt marsh that we built at Wolli two years ago, but to have them nest on this newly created area nearby is really special.

"Both parents incubate the eggs and we're hoping that they are successful in hatching out and raising their new chicks despite the challenges of city life. As ground nesters they are extremely vulnerable to attack from dogs, foxes and cats."

Mr Ibbetson said NPWS had cordoned off the area with an exclusion zone and have alerted local dog walkers to avoid the area and keeps dogs on leash at all times.





Closure of the bridge over the Henderson Street Weir has angered many local commuters who now find their path to Turrella railway station blocked.

Recent flooding has seriously weakened the bridge supports so Canterbury and Rockdale Councils have boarded up the bridge until decisions can be made on a safe temporary shoring up while designs are drawn up for a new bridge and it is built, a process that will take up to two years.
